

## Ismail Fattah Al-Turk

(Basrah, Iraq, 1934 - Baghdad, 2004)


Graduated from the Academy of Fine Arts in Baghdad in 1956 with a degree in painting; obtained a second degree in sculpture from the same institution in 1958. He also studied in Rome in the early 1960s. His work was greatly influenced by the ancient history of Mesopotamian civilization, as evidenced by the kind of human faces he used to paint. He practiced both painting and sculpture, and his artistic identity is a mix of both. The art of Picasso was also a major influence. He taught at the College of Fine Arts of the Baghdad University. Fattah worked on major public commissions in Iraq most notably the Martyr's Monument in Baghdad: one of Saddam's most important and costly projects, it transcends national boundaries and is considered internationally to be a major work of art in the Middle East.





